Intestinal parasites may be tiny, but they can cause big problems. These unwelcome guests live in a dog's digestive tract and can lead to health issues ranging from tummy trouble to serious illness especially in puppies. The good news? They're common, treatable, and preventable.


Common types of parasites

ROUNDWORMS



Appearance: Long, spaghetti-like worms
Spread: Ingested from soil, feces, or mother's milk
Symptoms: Bloated belly, diarrhea, vomiting, poor
weight gain, worms in stool or vomit
Risk: Very high in puppies
Contagious? Yes — spreads through feces to dogs
and sometimes humans

HOOKWORMS




Appearance: Tiny, thread-like worms that latch onto the intestinal wall (not visible in poop)
Spread: Contact with contaminated soil, feces, or from nursing

Symptoms: Bloody stool, anemia, weakness, weight loss, pale gums

Risk: Very dangerous to puppies; can be fatal Contagious? Yes — spreads to dogs and humans through contaminated soil or skin contact

GIARDIA



Appearance: Microscopic, not visible without a lab Spread: Contaminated water, shared bowls, or feces

Symptoms: Watery diarrhea, gas, vomiting, lethargy Risk: Moderate, higher in puppies or stressed dogs Contagious? Yes — spreads to dogs and possibly humans through infected water or surfaces

Common types of parasites

TAPEWORMS



Appearance: Flat, segmented worms; rice-like pieces in poop or near rear
Spread: Ingesting infected fleas or rodents

Symptoms: Mild scooting, licking rear, visible segments

Risk: Low, but uncomfortable

Contagious? Yes — dogs and humans can get infected through fleas or contaminated food/water (not direct contact)

WHIPWORMS



Appearance: Tiny, thread-like worms that latch onto the intestinal wall (not visible in poop)
Spread: Contact with contaminated soil, feces, or from nursing

Symptoms: Bloody stool, anemia, weakness, weight loss, pale gums

Risk: Very dangerous to puppies; can be fatal Contagious? Yes — spreads to dogs and humans through contaminated soil or skin contact

COCCIDIA



Appearance: Microscopic, not visible in stool Spread: Ingesting infected feces (kennels, parks,

littermates)

Symptoms: Watery or bloody diarrhea, weight loss, dehydration

Risk: High for puppies or sick dogs

Contagious? No to humans — but spreads easily between dogs via contaminated feces or surfaces
